

Since then, I've had the privilege of working on some of the most incredible projects both in London and around the world. That's something I'm proud of, of course, but what means even more to me is the positive impact I've made beyond the work itself on society and people. That's the legacy I'm building, and that's what I'm truly proud of.

What is the most useful piece of advice you've received during your career?

Funny enough, and maybe controversial, the most useful advice I ever got wasn't meant to be helpful at all! Someone once told me many moons ago, as a young South London Teenager, "I don't think Engineering is right for you..." And honestly? That was the spark. I didn't want to prove them wrong, I wanted to prove to myself what I already knew deep down ... that I belong here just as much as anyone else, and I had something valuable to contribute.

That backhanded 'advice' ironically became my fuel. It taught me that sometimes the most powerful motivation comes from the doubt of others - your path doesn't need anyone else's permission. For those reading this, you can have that as my first piece of guidance!
